# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CRUISING COMMITTEE

The Cruising Committee is responsible for planning and arranging all organized cruising activities undertaken by the squadron.

In the year 2007, four events were scheduled and completed: the first annual British Virgin Islands winter cruise in March, a weekend overnight to Marblehead in July, the running of the Dickson Cup in August, and the Summer Cruise to Maine also in August.

Our thanks go out to Heidi Bobo for organizing the BVI event in March. The Bobos and Nothnagles attended and met the Everetts one day in Virgin Gorda. This trip was a glorious winter break from the snow and cold of New England.

The overnight cruise to Marblehead was organized for the weekend of July 14<sup>th</sup>. There were four boats in attendance including the Jordans on *Saltwhistle*, the Bobos on *Poco*, the R. Durants on *Walkabout*, and the Seppelas on *Lianess*. They were joined by the Murrays in their whaler and the Gundersens in their 4-wheeled vehicle. The return home on Sunday was an exciting, very windy slog to the South but all arrived safely.

The Dickson Cup was run on July 21<sup>st</sup>. There were four larger boats and five Herreshoff 12 ½'s or Bullseyes for a total of 9 boats competing. However, the winds were not cooperative and only 3 of the larger boats completed the required three laps. *Tantara* won the Cup based on her lap-time handicap and overall enthusiasm.

Traditionally, the Summer Cruise marks the beginning of the end to our summer season – kids are finished with their sailing lessons and school has not yet started. Penobscot Bay in Maine was the destination for our itinerary which was to include several islands and harbors for rendezvous. The organized cruise included four boats: the Bobos on *Poco*, the Evans on *Whirlaway*, the Canneys on a charter named *Excellence*, and the Nothnagles and Chitticks on their charter named *Grand J*. They were joined along the way by the Sherbrookes on *Dulcinea*.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE

The August show was well received by both CYC artists and attendees, and seems to be a must for next year. Lastly, the season wound down with the annual Labor Day party and Chowder Day events. The Committee worked to cover costs and did need to increase prices on some parties. The increases were minimal, but were essential in supporting the increase in expenses and lower revenues. # ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ADULT SAILING PROGRAM

The Adult Sailing Program continues to be a model for how a program can further the mission of the Club and bring its members together. As has been the case in the past, members of all ages learned from each other and enjoyed getting to know each other around the shared desire to sail.

In this fourth season of the program, approximately 38 members were students and 22 members were instructors. Currently there are 44 members who are certified to use the three Club-owned sailboats. Of particular note is the fact that of the seven new family members admitted this year, five of the fourteen adults participated as students. Another interesting trend was an increased participation of three sub-groups: men, married couples and members of long standing. Due to the surge in enrollment and in certified sailor numbers, the Adult Sailing Committee requested that the Club purchase a second used Bullseye for instructional and recreational use. We are grateful to the Executive Committee for its approval of this purchase. The Club-owned sailboats saw much use outside of class including participation in the Club's racing events. A few more members, most of them students, purchased their own Bullseye or Herreshoff 12, adding to the growing Cohasset fleet.

Much of this year's program remained the same as the past three summers: three different class times each week over the course of the summer, a nominal fee for students, and volunteer instructors. Our two pot luck parties were hugely happy and successful events once again. In addition to this tradition, we had some new activities on and off the water. Instruction has been extended into September. We started the season with a "Rock Cruise," a low tide motor boat tour which was very helpful.

The greatest innovation is the interactive web site. Steve Brown created this fantastic tool. The website allows instructors and students to improve the curriculum by sharing what worked for them as a student or instructor. Each student's progress could be recorded on a "white card" on this web site. There is a huge amount of information on the website, from knot-tying demonstrations to sail theory. In addition, much of the scheduling/assigning of students was done using this tool. The site is <http://adultsailing.wikispaces.com>.

# COMMODORE'S REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CLUB ANNUAL MEETING 2007

In assessing the State of the Club, I looked for ways in which to evaluate the fulfillment of our Club's mission. The Club's mission is "*to encourage yachting through the promotion of good fellowship among those interested in sailing, seamanship and the enjoyment of the ocean and its environment*". Two sources came to light that I thought would be helpful; the first generated internally 10 years ago as new commodore Woody Chittick set out goals in the first issue of the *Binnacle*. The second is an independent assessment of successful yacht clubs published a few years ago by noted sailor and long time editor John Burnham of Sailing World Magazine.

Ten years ago Woody wrote of four areas of focus for his term:

1. Revitalize Sailing for all ages
2. Actively support Town-wide water oriented activities
3. Broaden Member Participation in Club Activities
4. Ensure the Club stays on sound financial footing.

Burnham's main thoughts for successful clubs include:

1. Sailboat racing brings people together
2. Day sailing events and cruises bring people together
3. Social Activities brings people together
4. Youth and Adult training are at least as important as all of the above.

I reference these as I think we do particularly well in both of their measures.

Our membership is very healthy! Our numbers have risen over the years to levels that we believe are appropriate for our capacities. In sustaining these levels, we benefit from continued interest by those who share a love of the water and can be counted on to join the ranks of our committees and programs. Care is taken by the Membership Committee to ensure the right fit with new members.

In looking at our communications, the *Binnacle* is now finishing its tenth year providing a steady flow of information to the membership. New members assume it has always been there but those of us who nurtured the first issues wondering if it would succeed, can now look with pride at what has unfolded. Added about four years ago, our web site has taken on similar importance. We continue to use it more and more for different ways to share detailed information of the Club's activities. These are real assets for CYC.

On the financial front, a focus of much effort over the last two years, we are doing particularly well. We have successfully completed our settlement with Davenport Crocker; this has restored us to solid financial status. Equally beneficial, this turn of events has led us to revamp much of the way we operate financially, and led us to develop disciplines around handling our money, saving and planning for current and future capital spending. Our new Finance Committee has overseen these changes with our Treasurer and will continue to monitor our financial activities going forward. We have funded the Capital Trust Fund to almost \$300,000 and have created a Capital Projects Fund of approximately \$236,000 (after this year's anticipated capital expenditures) and also created ways of replenishing monies to sustain the Fund into the future. These are fundamental developments for the Club.

As important as these financial matters are, and they are, they only support the mission; they do not fulfill the mission.

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It is the programs that we run and the engagement of the membership that fulfill our mission. Here too we are doing very well indeed. Our junior program, a traditional stronghold for the Club, is thriving. The enrollment numbers are at recent highs and families from afar are gathering in Cohasset to participate. The smile meter that measures the "enjoyment and interest" levels reads very high!

The addition three years ago of a formal program around adult instruction continues to be a sterling example of what we can accomplish in serving other members. We are stronger for the folks who are learning from one another in this program, growing more confident and enjoying the shared experience on the water. The Adult Sailing Program is producing growth in sailboat ownership and feeding interest in a range of racing and other sailing activities.

To quote Burnham "*finding ways of teaching others is vital to perpetuating the institution.*" "*The corollary to passing it on is giving back...its one of sailings best traditions*".

As you will see in the Secretary's report, ownership of racing boats, 210s, Herreshoffs, and Bullseyes are also at recent highs. In addition to active racing, more and more day sailing is evident.

Our social gatherings continue to evolve with new ideas leading to continued strong attendance. New themes like Waterfront Weekend and Cocktails on the Porch - now with Art! - are very well received & attended!

The Club enjoys a knowledgeable and hard working steward in Dave Marks, now in his 34<sup>th</sup> year with the Club. He is conspicuously praised for his continued ability to get us ready for the seasons one after another. He is always looking for ways to get our property in better shape, watching over the kids, helping set up for the next gathering in the Clubhouse, reliable at the wheel of the Dickson. Led by Davey we now have a great relationship with the new Harbormaster. We are indeed fortunate to have Davey on board!

Maintaining our balance is a challenge. We must encourage continued volunteerism by fighting the busy schedules that tug at all of us. We need to remember that the essence of our organization is to serve each other in one capacity or another. This, I believe, allows us here at the Cohasset Yacht Club to fulfill our mission in greater depth that can be with any other formula.

With all our successes we also have opportunities before us. Using new technologies will help to communicate and to find shared interests. Hosting regattas here in Cohasset has been a great way to share our strengths and the fabulous waters off our shores. We can do more of that. Day cruises around the Bay strike me as an opportunity to gather all generations to share a day on the water and all we know about it. We must continue a watchful eye on our railway and Clubhouse as the terrain shifts around them. Potentially this may require significant future effort and resources should it deteriorate further.

While there will always be room for improvement, I think you will read in the Officer & Committee Reports included in this issue of the Binnacle that we are excelling in our mission both by Woody's internal goals and by John Burnham's external measures.

With deepest sincerity, I want to thank all those members, too many to mention, who have worked so hard for this Yacht Club during my two years at the helm as Commodore.

It has been my distinct honor to serve with this Executive Committee and as Commodore of the Cohasset Yacht Club.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TREASURER

I am pleased to report that the Cohasset Yacht Club is in very good financial condition.

Our 2006 fiscal year end balance sheet showed total assets of \$1,047,569, total liabilities of \$5,439 which brings our total net assets to \$1,042,130. As of December 31, 2006, The Club was debt free and we anticipate The Club will continue to run debt free for the foreseeable future.

During the past year, The Club, with guidance from the finance committee, implemented an investment policy that among other things recommended the movement of the Capital Trust funds to Vanguard. That transition has been completed and the monies are conservatively invested in short-term money market funds. The balance in the Capital Trust as of 6/30/07 is \$294,649

Since our last annual meeting in 2006, we have returned to a more normal financial environment. Committees have managed budgets in keeping with The Club's philosophy of "as close to break-even as possible." As anticipated, the first half of 2007 is generally in line with our budgetary expectations. Earlier this year (2007), the club received the final payment from the Crocker settlement closing that chapter in the Club's history. However, the lessons learned from that experience remain and have been embedded in our financial methods. These methods continue to be reinforced and refined. The institutionalization the Club's finances and operating procedures is an important undertaking. These methods will not only maintain good accounting practices, but they will also ensure that this knowledge and experience is passed along to new groups of leadership who will operate and manage the Club in the future.

Over the past 12 months several important financial measures have taken place. The most significant of these include: 1) restoration of Capital Trust, 2) instituting a long range capital planning process, including formation of a capital projects fund, 3) documenting financial policies and procedures, especially around cash management and, 4) purchasing of new assets (for example: a new safety boat, 420 upgrades, a Bullseye and new electronics for the Dickson).

The Executive Committee has also approved additional maintenance expenditures for the second half of 2007 including: 1) re-shingling part of the clubhouse, 2) purchasing a new work boat motor, and 3) maintenance and grounds work around the barn.

On an operating level, the remainder of the 2007 year should end up within our budgeted forecasts. The Club is expected to make a modest net surplus by year end.

Lastly and most importantly, I would like to thank all the many members of the Executive Committee, Committee Chairs, Committee Members and The Membership at large for all the help and support in keeping The Club on course. In particular, I would like thank Molly and Bill McGowan for their efforts to assist me and lighten my load, Matt Steele for his commitment to the now fully functioning finance committee, Peter Pearce for his insight and help and lastly to our Commodore, Wisner Murray for his tireless efforts and guidance. Given all the substantial changes we have made throughout the last two years, it is most obvious to this Treasurer that team work and a genuine caring for The Club are abundant. I "Thank You" you all for a tremendous effort and a job well done!

## **ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**

This year the Club accepted seven families as new members and granted one Season Privilege to the son of a member. In contrast to recent years, none of these new members were legacies but there are experienced sailors in each of the new families: three own sailboats and the seven families have sixteen children among them, many of whom are expected to enter our Junior Activities program over the next two to three years.

Since last year's report, there have been 9 resignations, and ten conversions in status including two Families to Senior, one Family to Single, one Leave of Absence, two Families to Non-Resident and one Single to Non-Resident. Worth noting were 4 deaths of much-beloved current members: Tucker Collins, Uve Hublitz, Mary Soutter and John Thompson. Deaths of former members included past Commodore Phil Bowditch, Jack Crandell and Bud Railsback. They were all positive and active participants in Club life, and Tucker Collins' passing was particularly premature. Please keep their families in your thoughts.

Our Bylaws allow 260 Regular membership units (Singles and Families). For the various reasons cited above, from 2006 to 2007 Regular membership decreased by 5 to 246, despite the admission of the 7 new member families.

As all members know, the Membership Committee's mandate is to increase headcount very gradually, if at all, to avoid overloading Club facilities. Otherwise qualified candidates carried over from prior years and new expressions of interest are maintained in our Candidate Pool. Each winter/spring, the Membership Committee reviews all candidates anew, and processes those applications that best fit our criteria, most notably a demonstrated love of the water. We have been extremely pleased with the quality of applicants in recent years, and anticipate that this will continue.

We implemented a new wait-list procedure, improved CYC10 processes and worked to maximize the use of all club resources such as slips, dinghies and lockers. We supported the Club Treasurer in creating an itemized capital budget, while also working to comply with a well needed and more stringent bookkeeping procedure. Each member of the House Committee in 2007 would say they are leaving their "post" in better shape than when they first took over their specific roles.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RACE COMMITTEE

The year began with a splash at the Sullivan Regatta. A total of 12 boats competed in this year's event. It was a great success with Wiley Wakeman starting a great campaign by winning every race.

The Bemis had a great year of participation thanks to resurgence in the 210 fleet – led by Fleet Captain Mike Dickey. A total of thirteen 210s took part in this year's racing series racing – with Wiley Wakeman skippering Wahconda to again walk away with the season series – The Bemis Trophy. Second place was won by the team of Peter Goedecke and Rich Cate on Stiletto and Geoff Nothnagle and family steering the fiberglass version of Free Spirit to a third place overall.

Fleet Captain Woody Chittick continued to lead the Herreshoff Class with three regular season races and the single handed Sherbrooke. The H 12 ½ and Bullseye season series was won by Barbara Canney on Thistle to an overall victory – just edging out Arthur Young and his boat Scoot. Betts Murray almost lapped the fleet to walk away with this year's test of solo sailing the Sherbrooke Single-Handed Trophy.

Waterfront weekend was again a great family event. From a racing perspective, the Junior Memorial, with younger skippers taking the helm of the 210s, was won by Tyler Durant. The Aloha Bowl raced the same day was won by Peter Goedecke and Rich Cate. In the spirit of fun surrounding the Aloha Bowl, the best dressed boat and crew – attired in the best Hawaiian spirit – was awarded to the Curley Family.

The CYC received a special note of thanks from the Lincoln Sailing Center for running the Laser/Radial and 420 line at the Mass Bay Junior Olympics. This was by far the biggest line of the regatta with 80 boats in the 420 fleet and 30-35 boats in the Lasers/Laser Radial fleet. CYC provided the entire race committee team, including support boats.

The racing season concluded with the Annual Chowder Day events. While the wind was not the 15-20 that the race committee had hoped for, we did at least finish the racing. A large percentage of the CYC fleet competed and the awards ceremony (not to mention Chowder eating) went off without a hitch.

We would like to thank the executive committee and the membership for investing in new electronics for the Dickson. The new electronics help the RC set more accurate courses and are a significant improvement in safety on the water.
