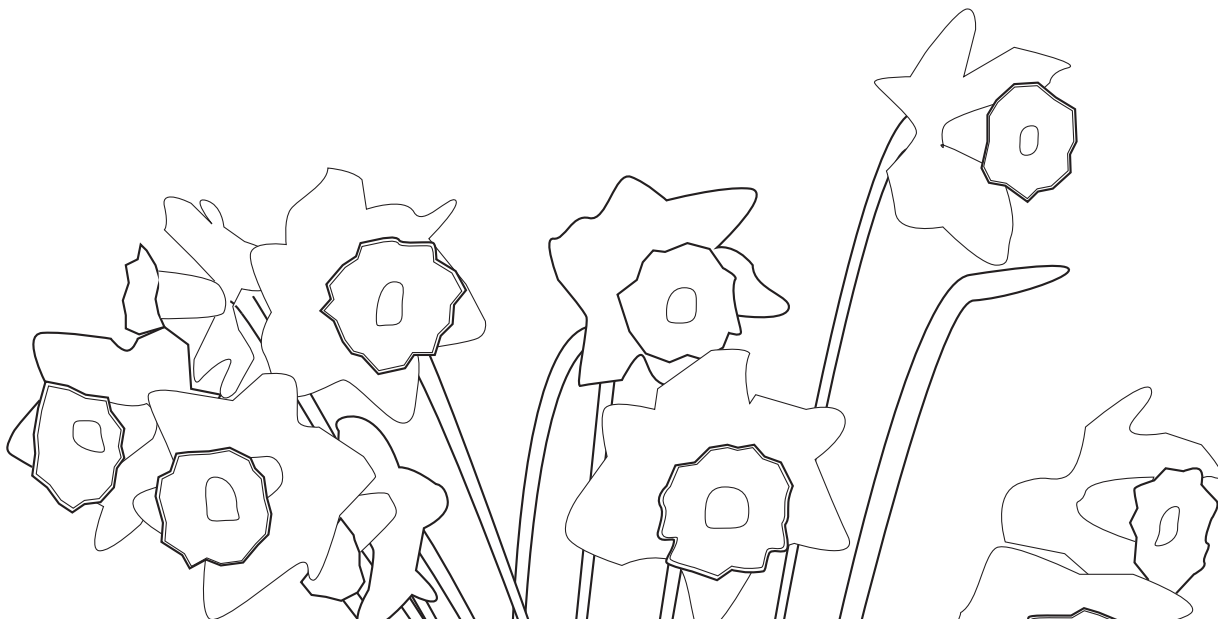
Dan & Stacey Steele live on King Street in Cohasset with their four children, **Charlie**, **Cameron**, **Emma** and **Elizabeth**.

CYC FISHING TOURNAMENT

You may have already heard that there are a few changes planned for the much-loved annual CYC Fishing Tournament. But don't fret - our motto is "Keep the Tradition with the Fishin'!"

In past years, the tournament has been held in mid-July, when many of the big fish go out to sea to do whatever it is that they do at that time of year. This has been frustrating for many dedicated fisher-persons, so this year the tournament will start in the middle of June and continue into July. The shotgun start will be at 6:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 12, and the first weigh-in will be at the traditional time of 1:00 p.m. that day.

The difference this year is that if your schedule, or the weather, or your skills are not in proper alignment with the stars, Jupiter and Venus, there's nothing to worry about. Not only will you have the opportunity to continue fishing after 1:00 p.m. on June 12, but you can fish every Saturday and Sunday from sunrise to 8:00 p.m., until noon on Saturday, July 10.

As always, there will be multiple prizes for both stripers and blues. Categories will include largest fish by weight, largest fish by length, fish caught on the first day, fish caught during the rest of the tournament, fish caught by those 16 or younger, fish caught each weekend, total number of fish overall...there will be many ways to be a winner.

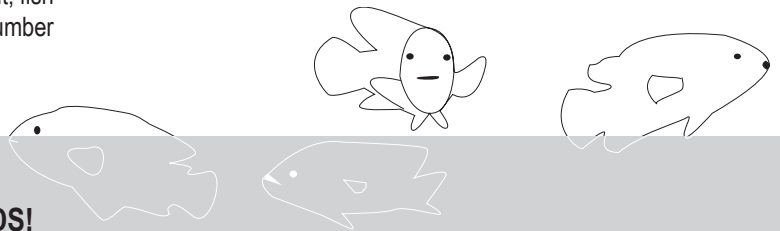
Each boat captain will be responsible for recording the date, time, length and weight of all qualifying fish in a log book at the club. **David Marks** will arrange for a launch driver to verify the statistics of each fish. Of course, if you bring a camera to record your catch, you'll have proof and bragging rights!

The last weigh-in will take place at noon on Saturday, July 10, with an award ceremony immediately following. As an extra added bonus, lunch will be available to all members, tournament participants, and their guests.

These details also will be available when you register, which you can do online or in person at the "Bluefish Ball" on June 11, between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Official tournament T-shirts will be on sale during the ball.

Great news! **Arthur Young & Marie Lefton** have purchased a 1968 Bullseye named "Scoot", and will be keeping her at a CYC slip this year. This increases the Bullseye class by 50%! I've heard that **Steve Bobo, Sr.** plans to launch his home-built Haven (a centerboard version of the Herreshoff) sometime in July. Knowing the Bobo clan, they'll prove formidable racers on Wednesday evenings! I've heard that there's another person in town with a Haven, who can't find a mooring or slip, so we may not see that for a while (the marina has a couple of years' waiting list, even for small boats, regrettably), but if any of you have a name and phone number of that owner, let me know. Bully II, the Morton-Schide's Bullseye, may still be for sale or lease, so if you hear of someone looking for a nice family sailboat, **Howard Schide & Sally Morton** can be reached at 383-3132.

And, of course, there's *Tar Baby*. I believe we have a buyer for this presently club-owned wooden Herreshoff who will (a) lovingly restore

her to the standard of excellence which she deserves, and (b) ultimately moor her in Cohasset waters per the donors' (**Bill & Ellen Stout**) stipulation. *Tar Baby* won the Vice Commodore's Cup six times over a twenty-year period (1936, '37, '39, '47, '48, and '55).

Proceeds from the sale of *Tar Baby* will go toward purchasing a club-owned Bullseye (used), primarily for adult sailing lessons and check-outs for weekend day sailing. This program has just received final approval by the Executive Committee (see article elsewhere), and if year one is successful, the plan is to purchase a second Bullseye next year, so our fleet is expanding at a good clip.

Needs

What we need are a couple more Herreshoff owners to maintain parity, gaff-rigged preferred. Having done a fair amount of sailing last summer, I am a believer in keel boats for these waters! So, know of any prospects who might be yearning to recapture the "being there" intimacy of small boat sailing? Let me know, and I'll pester them.

But more immediately, a number of you spoke to me about (re)dedicating some trophies to our fleet. While many of the classic Herreshoff trophies were converted to 420s (et al) years ago (i.e. the Commodore's, Vice Commodore's, and Junior Memorial cups), **Eric Crews** has a couple of very nice (so he says) pieces of hardware that we could use. But we need creative thinking: a Chowder Day cup is fairly obvious, but should we also do something for the Wednesday evening series? How about something special - a fun "obstacle" race to encourage family participation, like picking up balloons, in which better racers are somehow handicapped?

ADULT SAILING

Breaking news! After an extensive survey by **Bernadette Faulkner** and **Betts Murray**, the Executive Committee has just approved an adult learn-to-sail program. A number of our members would like to learn more about sailing in a tension-free environment. Does this sound like you?

In a few weeks, the club expects to purchase a used Bullseye to initiate this program in 2004. Keel boats, such as Bullseyes, are particularly suitable for Cohasset's sometimes choppy waters, giving a smooth(er) ride and plenty of leg room. They're virtually impossible to sink! And they're easy sailors.

Betts Murray will lead this program, which will feature both lessons and informal recreational sailing. Because we have a growing fleet of Herreshoffs/Bullseyes, Wednesday evening fun races are also part of the program. When not otherwise being used, we will also incorporate this first boat into the Junior Activities Program. Logistics such as sign-out qualifications, balancing use among members, and the teaching schedule are still to be worked out. .

To enhance this endeavor, some members have offered their boats for use in adult sailing so we won't be confined to a single-boat format. We anticipate extending the program right into September and October when our weather is at its peak, and kids are back in school, so people will have more time to teach, and sail. If the program grabs hold, a second Bullseye for 2005 is planned.

Details on each event will follow. In the meantime, please call **Mary Whitley** with questions.

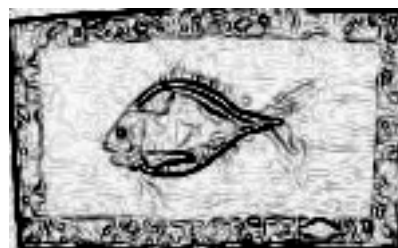

DAY TRIPS – A VISIT TO GRAPE ISLAND

Grape Island is located in Hingham Bay and is made up of two drumlins connected by marshy lowland. Spits extending from either end of this 50-acre island are remnants of a time when the island was connected to Weymouth Neck at its western end and Slate Island at its eastern end. Following a glacier's retreat 15,000 years ago, Native Americans migrated seasonally to the harbor islands. They harvested the bay's abundant fish, oysters and clams and gathered the island's wild fruit. Early settlers were attracted to the island's wild fruit crop as well, giving Grape Island its name.

The island's history has been primarily agricultural. Unlike most of the other harbor islands, no large-scale construction ever took place on Grape Island. There were no fortifications, hospitals, training facilities, casinos, schools or jails. As a result, most of the island still has an undisturbed feel to it; native plants are abundant, including six species of edible berries and the Park's most luxuriant growth of bayberry. Grape Island became part of the Boston Harbor Islands State Park in 1973.

NAUTICAL KNOW HOW –

A GLOSSARY OF LITTLE-USED NAUTICAL TERMS

Ear-ring – A small rope fastened to a cringle in the head of the sail, for the purposes of extending it along the yard. There are ear-rings for each reef.

Ebb – A receding current.

Elbow In The Hawse – Is when a ship being moored, has gone round upon the shifting of the tides, twice the wrong way, so as to lay the cables one over the other: having gone once wrong, she makes a cross in the hawse and going three time wrong, she makes a round turn.

End-for-End – A reversal of the position of any thing is turning it END-FOR-END. It is applied also to a rope that has run quite out of the block in which it was reeved, or to a cable which has all run out of the ship.

End-on – When a ship advances to a shore or rock without an apparent possibility of preventing her, she is said to go END ON for the shore.

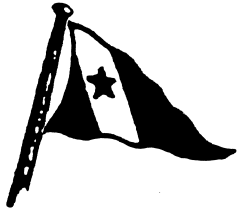
Even Keel – When the keel is parallel with the horizon.
